NEIGHBORHOOD ASSOCIATIONS' IMMEASURABLE IMPACT

Everyone has measurements they use to determine whether or not a program, project or organization is successful. For those of us involved in helping to organize neighborhood associations across Indianola, we know success when homeowners begin to take charge of their neighborhood and realize how much good they can make happen when they work together. Two of our associations have operated in some capacity ever since the Indianola Promise Community established an office downtown, or about five years ago. Three others have established themselves over the last couple of years and are going strong. Members have completed community beautification projects, have been instrumental in building the South Gate Kaboom Park at the Bethune Center, and have upgraded the look of the pool house in the Roosevelt Community. "We have accomplished quite a bit in our different communities over a short period of time," said Roosevelt Neighborhood Association President Marilyn James. "Our next step will be

doing collaborative projects among the associations to have an even bigger impact on Indianola." As these associations continued to complete project after project, several of them sought training necessary to become legally-recognized organizations. Over the past twelve months, with the assistance of an independent consultant and support from the IPC office, three of the five neighborhood associations have become non-profit organizations with the other two well on their way. Another organization took the consultation a step farther and formed a female farmers' co-op, strengthening their ability to sustain themselves. "With the right amount of assistance and direction, each organization will begin to realize that they can accomplish things they hadn't even imagined before," said Mary Dotts-Martin, president of the New Directions Neighborhood Association. "We hope to continue serving the citizens of Indianola while sustaining our organizations as well." Going forward, the training will continue in the form of grant development, public relations and community organizing. This means more afterschool programs, more workforce development, more mentorship and more empowerment for the citizens of Indianola. We believe these neighborhood associations will continue to mature into sustainable groups for our community because of factors that are hard to measure: commitment, passion and determination.

Congratulations to the Class of 2016-High School Seniors. Here are a few tips for students planning to attend college and live on campus!!

The Art of Living Smart Summer Camp Sponsored by the BB King Museum.

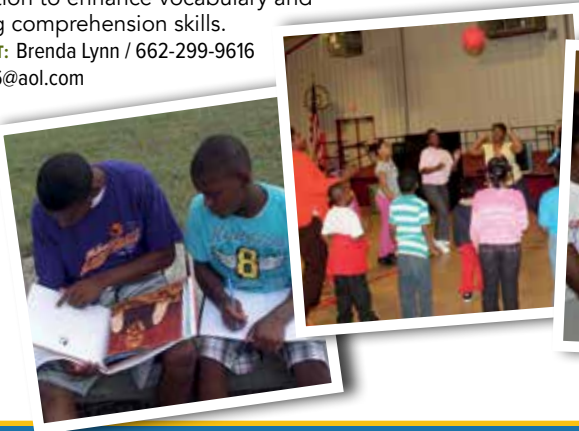

There were three movie theaters in Indianola: The Honey located on Front Street, The Regent located on Court Street, and an unnamed movie theater located on Hotel Ave which is currently named Court Street before it turns into Church Street. There was also a drive in theater called The Mojack located behind what is now Slater's on Hwy 49. It was open in the late 1940's to the early 1960's.
