IPC PROGRAM SPOTLIGHT



Promise School

Entering “big” school can be one of the most exciting yet scariest times for upcoming kindergartners. And, for parents, it is a milestone event as their child transitions from pre-school to formal school and begins their educational foundation needed for future learning. Indianola School District, in partnership with Indianola Promise Community, is helping to make this transition easier with the Promise School’s **“Roaring into Kindergarten”** Program.

A program designed to prepare incoming kindergartners and their parents for this milestone in their child’s life, Promise School provides children with the opportunity to experience kindergarten during the summer months and gives them that much-needed boost into kindergarten curriculum and day-to-day classroom operations.

This summer, 120 rising kindergartners are participating and receiving help from 27 teachers in the Promise School program. Located at Lockard Elementary, Promise School is one of the most successful early learning programs in the Mississippi Delta and has grown in reputation as a program that really makes a difference. Children come to the program from Head Start, traditional daycare and from families that home school.

“From day one, we start impressing on our children that this is their high school graduating class. We tell them, ‘Look around. All of you must graduate together,’” said Jeffrey Blackmon, Lockard principal during the school year and director of the Promise School in the summer. Blackmon is dedicated to providing Indianola children the best opportunity of starting strong in school with a solid educational and social foundation to build upon.

With about 14 students and three teachers per class, each child receives the individual attention needed to learn. From 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. each day, five days a week for 32 days, the young students are involved in activities that will put them about nine weeks ahead of other kindergartners.

“In the past, there was very little communication between Head Start teachers and kindergarten teachers,” Blackmon said. “In this program, each class has a Head Start teacher, a kindergarten teacher as well as a teaching assistant from Lockard Elementary. We want to establish all those relationships before the regular school year.”

The school focuses on the basics – early literacy, spelling, writing skills, sound fluency, math and social skills. Equally important, the program concentrates on structure, a component often overlooked.

Promise School is an amazing opportunity for young students and has the ability to guide them into a bright and promising future.

Tips to help children eat more Fruit

- Set a good example for your child by eating fruit every day with meals or as snacks and offer children a choice of fruits for lunch.
- Top off a bowl of cereal with some berries (strawberries, blueberries, or dried cranberries.)
- Make a "smiley face" with sliced bananas for eyes, raisins for a nose, and an orange slice for a mouth.
- Replace candy with raisins or other dried fruits.
- Make fruit kabobs using pineapple chunks, bananas, grapes, melons and berries.
- Pack a juice box (100% juice) in children's lunches instead of soda or other sugar-sweetened beverages.
- Look for and choose fruit options: such as sliced apples, mixed fruit cup, or 100% fruit juice in fast food restaurants.
- Select juices made from 100% juice, not concentrate.

Who Says Learning Can't Be Fun?

While other children rest during the summer and/or go on summer vacations, children in Indianola continue to learn and have fun while doing it. As the heat is turned up, so is the learning.



Beginning its fifth year, IPC's summer camps program has become a vital part of the Indianola community with parents and children expecting an enhanced learning experience during June and July. Camps offer remarkable between-school and pre-school learning programs.

Over 500 children are attending eight camps this summer. Camps give children a safe haven during the summer months. Camps also help limit summer learning loss between the academic school year, while serving as an economic development driver, as they employ a significant number of Indianola residents.

2014 Summer Camps include:

Freedom Summer 2014 is sponsored by the Sunflower County Freedom Project. 7th-9th graders are provided core academic instruction, plus art enrichment and fitness training. Students also enjoy a weeklong visit to Ole Miss University.

Reading, Music & Drama is sponsored by the Raspberry United Methodist Men's Club. Three age ranges are targeted: 8-11, 12-14 and 15-18, with an emphasis on language, literature and reading. Activities include creative speech, dramatic arts, music, poetry and plays.

Farming & Literacy is sponsored by Indianola Main Street, Inc. This camp targets 14-19 year olds with a focus on language and literacy development. Participants interact with farmers and agricultural professionals with an emphasis on the importance of language and communication.

The Writing Camp is sponsored by On Track Community Development Corporation. Students from all grades enhance and reinforce their literacy,

vocabulary and writing skills through creative and fun programs such as poetry slamming, drama/theater production, spelling bees and arts enrichment.

College Preparation is sponsored by the Sunflower County Ministerial Alliance, 10th and 11th graders focus on preparing for college with the intent to complete a degree by placing an emphasis on vocabulary and reading comprehension.



Summer Reading is sponsored by the City of Indianola. Children ranging from ages 7-10 focus on reading comprehension and writing. This camp also include arts and crafts, drama, dance, word challenge, baseball and softball for participants.

Art of Living Smart is sponsored by the BB King Museum. This camp integrates the arts into health, nutrition and fitness.

Promise School is sponsored by Indianola School District and is a transition program for incoming kindergartners.

Additionally, the BBKM offers an eight-week summer camp program to eighty campers in an effort to prevent a loss of learning during the summer months and provide exposure to the arts, music, dance, fitness and culinary arts. The BBKM also presented the opportunity for children to take lessons in piano and guitar.
